Boyd Crawford Sparks Warrior Jayvees to 25-8 Win Over ELA

Sparked by a 96-yard punt return by Boyd Crawford, the El Camino Jayvee eleven crushed East Los Angeles 28 to 8 in their second contest, played last week.

The Warriors drew first blood when Ray Day swept left end from the Husky five for the teedee in the opening period. The try for extra point was not good.

A few minutes later East Los Angeles dented the scoring column for two points when Nick Vargas fell in his own zone while receiving a punt. Before the end of the first quarter Crawford got away on his 96-yard jaunt from his own four behind beautiful blocking.

East Los Angeles' only touchdown came in the second quarter when Joe Lopez carried the ball 37 yards. El Camino carried back strong, and Day carried the ball 35 yards to the Husky five. Bill Nutt went over for a touchdown and Vargas kicked the extra point to make the score 19 to 8.

The final score came when the Warriors' tiny Tommy Johnson ran around left end for 69 yards and six points.

The El Camino pigskinners took one more step toward their goal of a Metro Conference title by whitewashing a weak San Diego JC eleven 20 to 0 last Saturday night in the Balboa Bowl.

The triumph marked Camillo's fourth straight, and second conference win in a row.

Camino scoring twice in the first period and once in the final, combined a smooth ground attack with accurate passing to befuddle the inept Knight squad.

Paul Held had a great evening as he completed five passes in five attempts for 56 yards, and personally accounted for one of the Warrior's three teedees. "Dancing" Don Miller and Ron Skirloff tackled up the others.

Fumbleitis and a woefully weak offensive machine spelled the San Diego downfall. They were held to only two first downs all evening. When the border boys did get off a long gainer, they would bobble the swineskin when tackled. It must also be added that Coach Bill Bailey played the contest with only about 10 reserves at his disposal. Some two dozen injuries left the squad badly crippled and undoubtedly held down the team's effectiveness.

BREAK PRODUCES SCORE

El Camino kicked off to open the game, and the Knights' Tom O'Brien returned the ball to his own 40-yard marker. On the second play from scrimmage, Don Junk broke through and snared Frank Castro as he attempted to pass. The ball popped away from Castro and was pounced upon by Dick Wright on the San Diego 19-yard line.

Don Miller raced to the 10 on the first play for Camino, but was trapped for a 3-yard loss on the next. Avery Smith then moved to the 7, and a 5-yard penalty on the Knights placed the ball only two yards away from paydirt. Vikings Flatten Tartars In 32-6 Bay League Tilt

Glue-Fingered Backs Run Amuck With Ball

Torrance's Terrible Tartars started the 1950 Bay League season with a boom here last Friday night—but it wasn't exactly the way they would have had it if they had been given much of a voice in the matter.

In this instance, the boom was lowered on them by a power-laden Santa Monica squad as the visiting Vikings rolled to a 32-6 victory over the local gridmen.

Torrance got its only touchdown in the first quarter when quarterback Jack Faren tossed a pass into the outstretched arms of end Irwin Kasten who romped on around the left side of the line for the score. Aramis Dandoy's attempt to kick the point missed.

PASSES CLICK

From then on, the game was all Santa Monica's. Halfback Ernie Neal and end A. D. Williams took pass after pass from quarterbacks Millard Paxton and Sandy Lederman and scampered to five touchdowns.

The Tartars were seldom able to penetrate the eight-man line which the Vikings threw against them. It's the same defense the Philadelphia Eagles use in professional ball and is evidently a good one.

DEFENSE GOOD

Especially noticeable in last week's game was the defense of about half a dozen Tartars. Irwin Kasten—who caught the pass for Torrance's only score—was a coach's dream on his defensive play during the game as were Ted Marcoux, the center, and line backers Dandoy, Frank Schmidt, Charlie Camou, and Glynn Boyce.

Santa Monica found the Tartar line pretty rough—although the pass defense was relatively weak. It was on the passing that the Vikings capitalized during the evening.

Considering the showing Inglewood made the same evening by downing Redondo Seahawks 19 to 0, the Vikings will have a few rough rows to hoe before the season is over.
