Civic Council Attacks Issues On State Ballot

Residents of Seaside Ranchos and Hollywood Riviera have combined talents to form what may be described as a human threshing machine. Purpose of this recently organized group, the Seaside Riviera Civic Council, is to sift the current crop of political propaganda, separate the chaff from the wheat, and then spread before the other residents of the community the council's harvest of facts.

THE GREEN CROP
At present the council's machine is at work on the fresh green crop of publicity hand-outs, both from protagonists and antagonists regarding the November 7 election. The council will not necessarily make recommendations concerning the various propositions but will put the carefully weighed and unbiased pros and cons of each issue before their neighbors. They will, however, poll themselves and publish the results.

OFFICERS NAMED
Current officers of the group include R. H. Blakeley, chairman, A. Rosin, vice-chairman, and E. S. Rowan, secretary. The council was organized shortly after the last election by local residents cognizant of the need for a well informed body whose primary concern was with municipal legislative and other governmental functions and acts which vitally concern the voting public. It is axiomatic that an intelligent, well informed public materially assists the work of our hard pressed public officials. It is this need for a central information service that the council hopes to fulfill through its study and discussion groups.

KNOW THEIR SUBJECT

Each problem, as it is placed on the agenda, is chairmanned by the individual whose experience most nearly parallels the subject. The Seaside Riviera Civic Council is desirous of having other communities within the city form similar groups and thereby extend the benefits of such organizations to all residents of the City of Torrance.
