### Steel Salaries Double Pre-War Pay, AIS Claims

Average weekly wage payments to hourly, piecework and tonnage workers in the iron and steel industry had increased fully twice as much as the cost of living from the prewar period of 1935-39 to the first half of 1950, according to the American Iron and Steel Institute. This comparison is based on data of the Bureau of Labor Statistics.

**BUYING POWER UP**  
As a result of these changes, the mid-1950 average weekly pay envelope of the steelworker contained enough purchasing power to obtain 44 per cent more goods and services than the pay envelope of 1935-39. In other words, the steelworker's "real" wage, or his purchasing power allowance for the increase in the cost of living, has gone up 44 per cent, the Institute claims.

The average actual weekly wage of steelworkers in July was \$37.53, an increase of \$40.73 over the five-year prewar period. It was also \$8.62 higher than the weekly average for production workers in all manufacturing.

**FUNDS INCREASED**  
Many iron and steel companies have substantially increased their payments into pension and welfare funds this year for the benefit of all classes of employees, but these increased ben-
