Varsity Downs Leuzinger Camou, Dandoy Spark Tartar Win

Now that they have had a taste of victory, there may be no stopping the Tartars—at least there shouldn't be any stopping them this week, because the local gridlers will play host to the El Segundo Oilers whose record this fall has been anything but impressive.

The Tartars got on the winning side of the ledger last week by downing the Leuzinger Olympians, last year's league champs, in a hard-played, 13-7 ball game on the Olympian's field.

Last Friday's win marks Torrance's second of the season, the first in league play. The Tartars opened the season with a win here over Glendale Hoover.

TARTARS' START
The Tartars opened the scoring at Leuzinger last week when halfback Aramis Dandoy plunged into paydirt from the five on the third play of the second quarter.

The score had been set up when the locals started marching from their own 32-yard line. Charlie Camou picked up four yards on the first play, then the referees ruled that the Olympians had interfered with end Irwin Kasten as he was trying to receive a pass from Dandoy and the Tartars had the ball on the middle stripe.

Dandoy carried to the Leuzinger 47, then he passed again to Kasten on the 40, and Beryl Jones carried it over the tackle to make it a first down on the 36.

DANDYO LOOSE
Dandoy then carried to the 30. Billy Crawford carried, to the 29, and Dandoy broke loose and got clear down to the 7 before being run out of bounds just as the gun sounded ending the first quarter.

Two plays picked up two yards for the Tartars, then Dandoy went through for the score. His attempt to kick a conversion was blocked, and the Tartars led 6-0.

START AGAIN
The Tartars started their second scoring drive late in the third quarter and pushed across their final score shortly after the fourth quarter got under way.

Dandoy started the drive on the Leuzinger 44 when he plunged through the middle for eight yards. Jones carried for no gain, then Dandoy made it a first down on the 32. A

15-yard pass from Dandoy to Kasten made it first down again on the 17. Dandoy then skirted around end to the eight, then through the middle to the four, where it was first down and goal to go.

Halfback Glynn Boyce carried down to the two, Jones pushed the ball up to the one, and Camou went over for the Tartars' second Tee Dee. Crawford passed to Dandoy in the end zone for the extra point. The Tartars then led 13 to 0.

OLYMPIANS MOVE
The Olympians didn't get their score until in the last minute of the game. They set up their lone touchdown when a punt by Dandoy was blocked after a bad pass from center, and the Leuzinger gridlers took over on the 24-yard line. A personal foul charged against the Tartars put the ball on the 10. A six-yard pass from quarterback Bob Neal to Mervel Pederson set up the ball for the TD play which was successful after the ball had been rammed to the one-foot line. Jim Zeller converted with 20 seconds left in the game.

An attempt at an onside kick failed when an alert Tartar covered the ball before it went over the 50-yard stripe. One quarterback sneak later, the Tartars had won the game.


