El Camino Ranks Eighth in JC Grids of Nation

El Camino's 1950 edition of pigskin power has been ranked eighth among the nation's junior colleges by leading newspapers and Lyle Chapman's All-American Gridiron Index.

By allowing their opponents only 21 points in six games, an average of 3.5 points per game, the Warriors are rated the top defensive junior college team in the nation. Pacing the point-makers is East Mississippi JC who had rolled up a total of 230 points up to last week.
