With the Metropolitan Conference title hinging on the outcome, the two undefeated and untied eleven in conference play, East Los Angeles and El Camino, will crack helmets Thursday, November 23, Thanksgiving Day, at 12 noon on the Alondra Park greensward. The contest will be the Jaycee game of the week.

Coach Al Hunt's power-packed Huskies have swamped all opposition this season, except for a 10 to 0 loss suffered at the hands of the Long Beach CC Vikings, the defeat snapping the Huskies 15 game win skein.

The Warriors will be gunning for their initial conference grid championship. "Dancing" Don Miller, Avery Smith, Joe Bellante, Dick Turner, and Ron Skriflof, will attempt to match the Elans running attack. Miller sports a 6.33 running average with 418 yards picked up in 66 carries to lead the local ground gainers. Injuries will probably keep halfback Gary Van Vliet out of the contest and may prevent halfback Wayne Bird and end Bud Licht from seeing much action.

HUSKIES ROLL
The Elans, defending conference champions, have steam-rolled 246 points to their opponents 101 in dropping Chaffey 41 to 7, San Bernardino 21 to 8, Valley 61 to 10, Harbor 14 to 7, Santa Monica 55 to 6, San Francisco CC 20 to 14, and Bakersfield 34 to 21.

Facing the offensive punch of the Huskies are fullback Lewis "Hustler" Williams and Wilbert "Doc" Inman. Williams has totaled the swinekick 87 times for 486 yards and a 7.26 average, while Inman averages 5.08 with 203 yards gained in 40 chances from scrimmage. An able sup-

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

CHUCKERS ADEQUATE
In the chucking department quarterbacks Ben Vartanian and Lionel Sandoval do an adequate job. The former has completed 37 of 86 heaves for 532 yards and seven touchdowns, and later has thrown 43 passes, connecting with 20 for 340 yards. Among the completions was one teedee toss.

Ends Manuel Perez and Bob Hughes, tackle John Pulice, and Guard Don Pennington are the backbones of a forward wall which averages 201 pounds per man.

Perez has picked off 21 passes for 372 yards and five touchdowns. He is extremely fast and elusive for a wingman. Hughes, Huskie team captain, is next among the receivers with 15 catches, eating up 252 yards and three teedees. Pulice is a stocky 225 pounder who specializes on offense. He was all-city at Garfield high school in 1947, and spent a short stint at USC two years ago. Pennington was an all-Metro Conference guard last year and is one of the finest all-around linemen in the conference. He has a good chance of repeating the honor this year.

AERIAL THREAT
Camino quarterbacks Paul Field and Don Young have been doing surprisingly well in the passing game lately, and their toasting might well be the main factor in the Caminote offense. Field has notched 24 completions in 45 attempts for 247 yards, while Young has thrown 72 times and hit on 25 for 313 yards.

Camino Still Hopeful for Bowl Contest

The smell of young, budding roses is getting very strong around the Long Beach City College campus as the Vikings continue to roll on undefeated. Latest victim in the long list of defeated foes was Pasadena City College, who went down 13-7 last Thursday evening.



Palo Verde is one of the leading candidates for the Desert Bowl, while Santa Rosa is a virtual cinch for the Evergreen Bowl.
