ANTI-FLY CAMPAIGNER STRICKEN WITH POLIO

One of the front-line campaigners in last year's fight against flies, believed to be a carrier of polio, has been hospitalized following a recent attack of polio.

Confined in the Kabot-Kaiser Institute in Santa Monica is Mrs. J. F. Zeiser, a mother of two young children. She lives at 17103 Casimir avenue.

According to Mrs. J. F. Zeiser Sr. who arrived here last Saturday from Peoria, Ill., to care for the stricken woman's children, the polio victim will be in the hospital at least three months. She reported that her daughter had not suffered complete paralysis although she has lost most of her muscular coordination ability.

It was Mrs. Zeiser who joined with other North Torrance residents last year to lead a successful fight to squelch an increasing fly menace throughout the city and particularly in North Torrance.
