Caminoville Rejoices as First League Tilt Comes to Campus

Playing in what could have been called "The Oven Bowl" game last Thanksgiving Day, the El Camino Warriors led with their Sunday punch and kayoed the East Los Angeles Junior College Huskies 14-7 to gain the Metropolitan Conference championship for 1950.

Quarterback Paul Held was the "Man of the Hour" after he had scored one touchdown and passed to Avery Smith for another to wrap up the conference decider, and enhance El Camino's chances of receiving a bid to a post-season bowl game.

After two quarters of rock-sock-um football, the Warriors led the Huskies 14-0 at half-time. East Los Angeles was used in the fourth period for a score, and threatened again just before the game was over, but the gun sounded with Fullback Dick Turner carrying the ball to the four-inch line for El Camino after the Huskies threat had been stopped.

NO LOOP LOSSES
Last Thursday's win gave the champions a season record of eight wins, one loss and a tie. In loop competition, their record stands at five wins and no losses.

In the opening period Ron Skirloff, playing fullback for the winning Warriors, recovered a Huskie fumble. Left half Don Miller ran 52 yards down the sideline before being forced out on the two. Held sneaked over for six, and Turner kicked the conversion.

HOOKS HOOKS PASS
In the second quarter, End Bob Hooks intercepted a Huskie pass to set up the second touchdown. Held passed to Smith for the last 36 yards. Turner's boot for the extra point was again perfect.

Midway in the final period Lewis Williams, fullback, plunged into the end zone from the 12 after the Huskies had marched 42 yards. Tom Zaby kicked the extra point.

Homecoming crowds which nearly filled the new El Camino stadium thrilled at the halftime parade of floats headed by the dazzling grid queen, Lillian Farmer. Floats from many of the college's organizations competed for the sweepstakes honor, which for the second year in a row was won by Phi Sigma Upsilon.

Card stunts in both rooting sections and entertainment by bands and drill teams of both schools added to the halftime entertainment.


