


Work to Start on YWCA Building

Ceremonies to Mark Start Of \$27,000 YWCA Project

Groundbreaking ceremonies for the new \$27,000 YWCA building, to be located in the park-like triangle at Carson street and Plaza del Amo, will be staged Monday afternoon at 3 o'clock, states Mrs. L. A. McCoy, representing the YWCA building committee.

The building, designed by Roscoe Wood, local architect, will be an "L" shaped, modern ranch style structure with an audience capacity of 250 persons. Facilities for serving 150 for a banquet have been provided in the reinforced brick structure.

The main hall, 60 by 30 feet, features a 10-foot fireplace. A long entrance porch, decorated with flower boxes and faced with the YWCA emblem, leads to a well-lighted entry which in turn opens onto the patio and main hall. Four doors open from the main hall onto a covered patio.

Wood designed the kitchen with a separate service entrance and a large service counter for speedy kitchen-dining room service.

The interior will be unplastered brick and will be lighted by fluorescent lamps set parallel with rafters for indirect illumination. Eventually the large hall will be equipped with folding doors enabling the hall to be divided when needed.

Taking part in the ground-

breaking ceremony will be many of the civic personalities who have helped the Torrance Junior Woman's Club, sponsors of the project. Among those who will have a part in the public ceremony are Jackie Johnson, Miss Torrance of 1950; Mary Schultz, general chairman of the 1951 Queen Contest; Mrs. Robert Morton, president of the Junior Woman's Club; Sam Levy, construction chairman; Roscoe Wood, architect; Mayor Boh L. Hagard; Frank Dominguez, representing the Torrance merchants; Julia Stamps, YWCA committee chairman and Mrs. McCoy, the building committee chairman.

Of the total sum necessary to complete the building, the Junior Woman's Club has raised \$31,750 through the sponsorship of the past five Miss Torrance contests. The 1951 contest will soon be launched to add to the building fund. With the support expected from the current queen contest and augmented with donated supplies and labor, the sponsors of the YWCA project expect to raise the needed \$27,000.

Actually the work started on the building nearly 10 days ago when stakes were set out by C. B. Bagnall, local contractor, who has volunteered his services on the project.

Dean Sears, gifts chairman has procured much of the supplies which will be used in the building.

College Adding 26 New Courses To Curriculum

Twenty-six new courses have been added to the curriculum of El Camino College for the spring semester beginning February 1, according to Dr. Lyle Tussing, director of instruction.

The new classes supplement the wide variety of technical, business and liberal arts courses previously incorporated in the college program. All classes are tuition-free and are offered on an extended day basis. The college is open from 8 a.m. to 10 p.m.

Among the new courses offered are advanced ceramics, an accelerated course for office workers, business correspondence, business conferences, English for foreign-speaking students, intermediate French, costume design and clothing selection, fundamentals of costume construction, law for the layman, credits and collections, intermediate Spanish and interpretation of Shakespeare.

New technical and industrial courses added include machine shop methods, industrial electricity, electrical drafting, instruments of industry, petroleum refin-

ing and aircraft drafting. Former students in day classes and all evening students will register for the spring semester according to an alphabetical schedule on January 29, 30 and 31. New day students will register January 31.

Placement and qualification tests for students planning to enroll in English, chemistry, business and mathematics courses for the first time are scheduled Saturday, January 20.

Schedules of classes and full information are available at the college.


