Slight Increase Noted in Job Seekers Here

Persons seeking employment through the Torrance branch of the State Department of Employment here have increased slightly during the past month, according to a report issued Monday by Miss Winona Ellis, manager of the local branch.

As of the date of her report, Miss Ellis reported that 561 residents of the city were registered for work with her offices. Of this total, 321 were women and 240 were men. Thirty per cent of the men were veterans.

Leading the list of those seeking employment were 113 persons registering for clerical positions.

Others included 25 professionals, 47 sales persons, 96 service persons, 85 skilled workers, 91 semi-skilled, and 104 laborers. The total registered at this time last month was 539.
