This week's choice of books represents a cross section of early-day life in America beginning with the Pilgrims. Students of American history will find much to interest them in the period treatment of these four widely different books.

PLYMOUTH ADVENTURE, Ernest Gebler
Based on careful research, here is a recreation of the epic of the Mayflower; the long voyage, full of hardships, across the Atlantic and the first few months on the bleak New England coast. Graphically described are the men and women and their daily struggles, so that Priscilla and John Alden, William Bradford and many other historic figures become living people in a real world.

DIAMOND WEDDING, Wilbur Street
Here again is the American frontier; the rugged mountain land of Colorado in the '60s. The hero and heroine are marked by the capacity to survive and even prosper in the hardships and strain quite unknown by Americans today. It is a story of time, place and manner of life never to be known again. A more iron-spirited couple you can't imagine than Hope and Gowd Skinger; but they weathered through rugged times to be feted by children and grandchildren in their Diamond Wedding celebration.
