**Your Old Records Wanted by G.I.'s At Camp Cooke**

Torrance's 578th Combat Engineer Battalion now training at Camp Cooke, this week has an appeal to all local phonograph records and records, whether they be Beethoven, be-bop, or boogie woogie.

The request urged southland citizens with unwanted phonograph records to donate them to the camp's recording library for use on the soldiers' own G.I. radio station which broadcasts to the entire camp.

**Fire Inspector Explains Best Burning Methods**

A total of 362 fires caused by open burning and defective incinerators in the first four weeks of the new year, has prompted officials of the Los Angeles City Fire Department to urge the citizens to exercise extreme vigilance and care in the removing and burning of dry grass and rubbish from around their homes.

According to Joe J. Simpson, Fire Inspector for Harbor City, Shoestring Strip and Gardena, it is best to cut dry grass and stack in small piles and the burning of uncut vegetation is permitted.

"Before doing so," Inspector Simpson stated, "a firebreak must be cleared which is wide enough to insure against fire getting out of control and doing damage to structures, fences, trees, shrubs or any property in the way. The hazard involved should determine the width of the break but six feet should be the minimum."

Burning of this type in Los Angeles requires a written permit from the closest Engine House and the legal burning hours are from 6 a.m. to 3 p.m. of any day, including Saturdays, Sundays and Holidays.

"The legal hours for burning in an incinerator, or more than 25 feet away from any building or structure, with a competent person in charge, are between 6 a.m. and 10 a.m. It should be particularly stressed that an oil drum is not a legal incinerator and when used should be considered as open burning."

"Additional information that the average citizen perhaps does not know," said Inspector Simpson in conclusion, "is that burning of tree trimmings is permitted only after an inspection by Battalion Chief of the District. The issuing of the permit will be governed by the size of the pile to be burned and the prevailing wind conditions."

**INGLEWOOD ADMITTED TO METRO. WATER DIST.**

The Water Problems and Public Relations Committee of the Metropolitan Water District took affirmative action on the Inglewood application for annexation on Friday, January 26.

The committee's report to the Metropolitan Board recommended tentative approval of membership for Inglewood and all unincorporated territory to the south and southeast of Inglewood closed yesterday to West Basin Municipal Water District. The cost of membership for the annexing territory was estimated to be about three million dollars, payable in 30 equal annual installments. Installment payments may be made in whole or in part from municipal funds or by special tax levy.

The committee also recommended that the Metropolitan engineering staff be directed to meet with Inglewood and West Basin representatives to determine the most feasible and economical means of conveying Colorado river water to Inglewood and other portions of the territory to be served. Immediate delineation of boundaries of the area under consideration was also recommended in order that legal description of the territory may be included in petitions required to be circulated and presented to the West Basin Municipal Water District Board of Directors.

**Rome Cable Awarded Signal Corps Contract**

A sizable Signal Corps contract for the manufacture of a special communications wire was awarded this week to Rome Cable Corporation's New York plant, it has been announced by A. D. R. Fraser, company president.

A new building covering approximately 120,000 square feet will be erected to handle the contract, Fraser said.

Officials of the Torrance plant said none of the contract would be filled here.

**Alert Employers To Deadline for Income Returns**

Thomas H. Kuebel, chairman of the franchise tax board, warned employers that they should turn their attention to filing information returns, forms 599, relating to State income tax.

Deadline for filing form 599 is February 15, he pointed out. The form is to be filed for all single employees who earn \$2,000 or more and married persons whose combined income is \$3,500 or more.

Kuebel warned that although charitable organizations and government agencies are themselves exempt from tax, they must also file information returns forms 599. These forms must be accompanied by a summary return form 596. Forms may be secured from the Long Beach office of the board at 308 Hartwell building, Long Beach.

He said that while domestic help is subject to the Social Security Act for the first time this year, employers of these workers must file information returns, form 599 as heretofore.

He also said that this year it will be permissible for employers to file copies of federal form W-2 instead of state form 599 to report wages of their employees.

**Tax Collectors Try to Make Payments Easy**

Deputy Collectors of Internal Revenue have been stationed at 88 points throughout Southern California to make it as convenient as possible for residents of the district to pay their income tax, it was reported this week by Robert A. Riddell, collector for the Sixth District of California.

At any of these offices, all income tax forms may be obtained, those desiring advice as to the preparation of their returns may obtain it without cost, completed returns may be filed, and the tax due may be paid.
