


**Nancy Holmes SUGGESTS**



If you want a hearty round of applause from the family—better still the platter licked clean—serve this luscious chicken pie one night soon. The recipe comes to you from the Best Foods consumer kitchens and it's been tested and tasted to make certain you'll bring down the house.

- BESS' CHICKEN PIE**
- 2 cups diced cooked chicken
  - 6 small white onions
  - 2 cups peas
  - 1 cup mushrooms
  - 1 slice
  - 4 tablespoons
  - 1 1/2 cups sifted flour
  - 1 teaspoon salt
  - 1/2 cup vitaminized margarine
  - 1/4 teaspoon celery salt
  - 1/4 teaspoon thyme or marjoram
  - 2 cups chicken bouillon or stock
  - 1/4 cup evaporated milk
  - 2 tablespoons sliced pimiento
  - 1 tablespoon minced parsley
  - 5 tablespoons water
  - 2 tablespoons margarine

Dice cooking chicken, leaving some fairly large pieces. Cook onions and peas in boiling salted water, drain. Sauté mushrooms in margarine until lightly browned. Stir in flour and seasonings until smooth. Gradually stir in chicken bouillon and milk mixture, cooking and stirring constantly until thickened. Meanwhile, prepare pastry by cutting margarine into flour and salt mixture until coarse crumbs are formed. Add water and grated onion gradually, stir until mixture holds together. Roll out about 2/3 of the dough on a lightly floured board. Line bottom and sides of a 1 1/2 quart baking dish up to the top edge. Trim off edges. Pour sauce, chicken, vegetables, pimiento and parsley into pastry lined dish. Roll out remaining dough and cut in 1-inch strips. Arrange lattice strips over pie, attaching each to the edge of bottom crust. Flute crust. Bake in a hot oven (400 degrees F) about 20 to 25 minutes or until nicely browned. Serves 6.

**Interesting Courses Offered Career Women, Homemakers**

Among the more than 500 courses to be offered in the spring semester of University College, late afternoon and evening division of the University of Southern California, are many designed to be of special interest to both career women and homemakers in the Southland.

Classes will offer college credit and will open February 12 according to Dr. Carl Hancey, University College dean. They will meet for a 19-week period.

Women's club officers and committee chairmen will have an opportunity to learn the principles of parliamentary procedure in a course to be offered on Wednesday evenings by Dr. Alta B. Hall, associate professor of speech. Duties of officers, committee procedures and the drafting of constitutions and by-laws will be covered.

For women in the business world, courses in such subjects as "accounting, shorthand, and typing, operation of office machines, filing and indexing systems and office management, will be held.

Subjects of interest to home makers will include a general course in planning the home, which will cover topics from site selection to furniture arrangement. Also scheduled are courses in fine arts, design and interior decoration.

In the field of arts the spring semester will offer classes in music and drama, radio, literature, painting and drawing, ceramics, and writing for the screen, stage, radio and magazines.

In the professional field, courses are planned in physical and occupational therapy, social work, education and sociology. A special course in storytelling for parents, teachers, librarians and students will be offered by the special department.

**Nursing Resources Evaluated By Local Association's Head**

Mrs. Marguerite Davidson, chairman of the San Pedro Nurses' Association's Committee on Nursing Resources, said today that members of her committee would be announced shortly.

Nurses occupying key positions in the Greater Harbor Area will serve on this important new committee. Many phases of professional nursing will be represented, including public health, private and general duty, office nursing and nursing education.

Mrs. Davidson, who represents nursing on the local Civil Defense Committee, will serve in a liaison capacity between the San Pedro Nurses' Association, District 21, and the local defense committee. She is responsible for assembling pertinent data on nursing resources in this and surrounding communities.

The Nursing Resources Committee will serve as a "clearing house" for information regarding all phases of the profession. At present Mrs. Davidson is compiling an up-to-date list of those engaged in the various nursing fields, whether active or inactive.
