


## Pilgrimage Play To Be Shown at Methodist Church

Spiritual living, which includes health, harmony, beauty, and brotherly love, will be considered in the Sunday Bible Lesson on "Soul" in all Christian Science churches.

Frank L. Miller has been appointed director of First District Community Chest Service Center, it is announced by Floyd Y. Snyder of San Pedro, chairman of the Harbor Board of Welfare Federation of Los Angeles Area.

In his new post, Miller will be in charge of Community Chest Service Centers in Torrance and in San Pedro, and will as well direct the Fall Red Feather campaigns in the Harbor District working with volunteer leaders throughout the area. He succeeds Alan Fite, who resigned as of December 1 to become executive director of Pasadena Welfare Council.

Miller is a graduate of University of Southern California where he received his master's degree from the Graduate School of Social Work. After enlisting in World War II, he left the armed services with the rank of major, having spent four and a half years in the European theater of war.


Miller directed the training
