Saturday night, the gang will travel to the lair of the Valley Junior College for the second meeting with that bunch. In their first meeting here several weeks ago, the Warriors chalked up a 61-35 victory over the Valley quintet.

Next Tuesday evening, the Camino Casabamen will trek over to Compton for a rematch with the Tartars of the Western States Conference. Early in the season, the Warriors topped the bunch 65-58.
