Third and fourth lectures of the series, to be presented on succeeding Tuesdays, February 27 and March 6, are titled "The Causes of War and the Conditions of Peace" and "Russia Versus the United States." All lectures are free and open to the public.

## Three Ceramics Classes Open To All Adults

Students learn to pour, to use molds, and to make finished products like dishes, ash-trays, vases, flower pots, wall decorations, and artistic pyxes.
