Crayons Good To Draw With-- But Not To Eat

A warning by Dr. Roy O. Gilbert, County Health Officer, that the eating of colored wax crayons sometimes makes children acutely ill, was issued to parents and teachers this week. Although the majority of children seem to suffer no ill effects from eating colored wax crayons, the report states that the recent poisoning of a six year old La Canada school child provides a need for teachers and parents to take precautionary steps to prevent similar poisonings in the future. Among children affected by the aniline dyes used in crayons, it appears that only a small quantity of the coloring is needed to produce illness.

Lot of Shooting But No One Heard A Single Shot

There seems to be quite a bit of shooting going on in the hills of the Palos Verdes peninsula these days—but nobody seems to mind. The shooting is being done with movie cameras! Shooting of the third film in three months in the Palos Verdes region began February 7 in the Portuguese Bend area. For three days Columbia Pictures will be photographing scenes for "China Corsair" just off the scenic Portuguese Bend coastline. Further footage will be taken along the sand beach in the Portuguese Bend Club grounds. "China Corsair," an adventure picture revolving around smuggling, stars Jon Hall and Elisa Faraday. One 60-foot vessel and two smaller power boats are being used to shoot film at sea. The other two motion pictures filmed on the Palos Verdes peninsula in recent months were 20th Century-Fox's "Follow the Sun," based on the life of Ben Hogan and filmed at the Palos Verdes Country Club, and "Smugglers' Gold," another adventure picture made by Columbia at Portuguese Bend. Negotiations currently are under way for shooting outdoor footage in the Palos Verdes area for "My Favorite Spy," a Paramount picture that will star Bob Hope.
