Coach Schedules Talent Contest For Track Teams

Tartar thineclads — the high school boys who have track ambitions — will start out the 1951 track season Monday afternoon at the high school stadium when teams of freshmen, sophomores, juniors, and seniors clash for the intramural championship of Tartarville.

It's scheduled to be such an important occasion around the school, that Principal John Steinhage has told the students that they may slip out to watch the civil war.

ONE OPEN EVENT

Open open event is scheduled — the 100-yard dash. All the rest will be limited to three classes: Varsity, Bee, and Cee.

The Varsity (or A class) will compete in the 440 relay, mile relay, 4-mile relay, highjump, broadjump, polevault, and shotput.

The Bees will clash in a 440 relay, mile relay, 3-mile relay (each man runs 1320 yards), a hurdle relay, highjump, broadjump, polevault, and shotput.

The Cees will have the 440 relay, mile relay, hurdle relay, highjump, broadjump, polevault, and shotput.

WELCH ON TRACK

Coach Rex Welch, who is slipping into track duties after finishing Cee and Dee basketball chores, looks for the seniors to cop the Varsity honors with the juniors giving them a battle, while the lower classes will battle for the Bee and Cee spots. Upsets are a dime a dozen in the sporting world, however, so no one can safely make any predictions.

LONG RACES FIRST

The first events will probably be the distance races, Welch said. The coach said the distance races would be "gotten out of the way" early.

The meet will be used as a testing ground for the 1951 track teams. Only two returning varsity lettermen are on Welch's roster. Most of the returning track veterans were Bee and Cee performers last spring.

Monday's meet will be one of the first real "lines" on this year's track squad that the coaches will have — what with season coming on so close on the heels of the basketball season.

CAGERS IN FINALE

Capping off the goodbye-casabamen-hello-horseholders day will be the varsity's last league game in basketball—a little set to with Inglewood on their own court. (We beat them here, remember?)

Just like the big league managers, Coach Wolfe this week was moaning dramatically about the condition of his pitching staff, to say nothing of the other assorted groans and moans about the prospects for the year. To begin with, First Baseman Jim Nady and Catcher Jim Taylor will be heading for the basketball game at Inglewood, so they will miss the horsehide tussle.

STARTING LINEUP

A probable starting lineup for tomorrow's baseball game will see Charlie Camou pitching, Johnny Spiller behind the plate, Jack Fees on first, Jimmy Murphy on second, Bill Crawford at third, Vic (All-Bay League) Ordaz at short, and Dickie Valdez, Jim Blackston and Al Knappenberger in the outfield.

To get ready for the fray, Wolfe scheduled a practice session at the park yesterday afternoon, and two for today (school's out today); one this morning and another this afternoon.
