

## BEES DROP GAME WITH INGLEWOOD

The Inglewood Bees proved too much for the TarBees Friday night as the Sentinel Lightweights romped to a 51-27 victory over Coach Vern Wolfe's cagers.

In their last meeting here on January 23, the TarBees gave Inglewood a run for their money before dropping a 53-50 contest. They were no match Friday, however, as the Inglewood team unleashed a scoring attack that couldn't be checked.

Leading 24-18 at the halftime, the Sentinel Bees raced on through the game, never letting up. Inglewood sank 13 out of 16 free tosses while the TarBees dropped in 11 out of 19. Jerry Farrar led the Torrance scoring with 11 points. Duane Milton and Diesel Valdez each collected four, and Leo Valencia sank three. There was no indication that the game was "fixed" at a Madison Square Garden.

## Causes of War To Be Subject

Whether they like it or not, the American people must be prepared to take part in world affairs, Albert S. Karr, El Camino College historian told a large audience attending the first of a series of free lectures being offered at the college Campus Center.

Third of the Tuesday night series on interpreting world events will be given by Karr on Tuesday, February 27, at 7:30 p.m. "The Causes of War and the Conditions of Peace" will be his topic. The public is invited. In his coming lecture Karr will discuss peace as a result of historical conditions and events and will outline possible roads to maintaining peace in a world of crises.

His introductory lecture analyzed the American attitude of trying to avoid foreign involvement, which he said was based on our social and historical background. "We try to interpret the rest of the world in terms of our own experience and background," he said, "with the result that other nations call us naive and we look upon other peoples as being incompetent and lacking initiative."

## FOREIGN CARS RETURN TO CARRELL SPEEDWAY

High horsepower European-built sport cars open their new year at Carrell Speedway in the first race meeting on a regular half-mile track under AAA sanction this Sunday afternoon at 2:30 p.m.

Amateur drivers from all parts of the Southland will gather at the Gardena raceway for the precedent-setting meet.

On the starting line will be a complete cross-section of sports cars, including XK-120 Jaguars, MGs, Allards, Rolls-Royces, Austins, Crosleys, Citroens, and others. Several "modified" cars will be entered, including an Alford chassis with a Cadillac engine and an MG with a Ford 80-horsepower engine.

Drivers include many trophy winning stars such as Phil Hill, Bazil Panzer, Don Parkinson, Jack Armstrong, Allen Moss, Johnny Van Newman, Michael Graham, E. Forbes-Robinson, and a host of other favorites. Time trials will roll at noon with the three-lap trophy dash set to open the competitive events at 2:30 p.m. General admission is still pegged at \$1.25 with a special reserved section at \$1.50. Kids under 12 will be admitted free if they are accompanied by an adult.
