Burt Johnson, pres. of North Torrance Civic Association, announces a Civilian Defense meeting to be held at McCarstairs Hall, 174 and Yukon on March 23 at 8 o'clock. Two very timely movies will be shown: "Pattern for Survival" seen on television of late, and another film equally as informative, Civilian Defense Director George Powell, Mrs. Don Hyde of the Red Cross, and Frank Carpenter, recreation director will be the speakers of the evening. The public is invited to attend. These movies will also be shown Saturday, March 24, for the children of this area.

At the monthly meeting of the North Torrance Civic Improvement Association, March 7, Charles Luger, horticulturist of El Camino College, gave a very informative lecture on the soil in our area. According to Mr. Luger we have an alkaline soil (black) which must be broken down. He suggests bean straw, peat moss, and highly recommended use of Gypsum (100 lb. to 300 sq. ft.). Too much water is being used, many plants die from over watering. Another very interesting fact Mr. Luger pointed out was not to use sawdust in flower beds. Sawdust takes away the nitrogen from the soil. Very little cultivation is necessary. In the event you are contemplating a new lawn Mr. Luger suggests for 1000 sq. ft.; work soil 8 in. with plow, 1 bale peat moss, 300 lb. gypsum (1.25 for 100 lbs.), 100 lb. soil sulphur, water down, smooth and roll, sow seeds (clover-blue grass) roll again, cover steer manure, water sparingly. Gypsum is needed every 8 months. Oh, to have met Mr. Luger 2 years ago!

El Camino has classes for adults in landscaping and on April 3 in the Campus Center a panel discussion will be conducted covering soil insecticides and propagation. Attend this discussion and aid your green thumb.
