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


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NORTH TORRANCE TATTLE

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Interest in Atomic Warfare Gaining On Old Age Problems

A lot of people may worry about being too lean or too fat, but that subject holds tenth place in the health interests of the people of this community according to a report issued this week by Dr. Roy O. Gilbert.

Heart disease, the nation's leading assassin, rates only eighth in interest, according to the report.

During the last five years a careful record has been kept of all requests for literature made to the department in response to the health officer's weekly health article, which appears in 186 of the county's daily and weekly newspapers.

It may be peculiar to Southern California's population group, but problems related to aging stand far in the lead of all other requests for information. Twice as many demands for literature on the problems of gerontology (old age) have been received than for its second-place competitor—sinus infection.

In order of popularity, the interest list reads: the problem of aging, sinus infection, nutrition, high blood pressure, arthritis, respiratory diseases (including influenza), cancer, heart disease, over-and underweight, and maternal and child health.

But—and you can call it a sign of the times, the County health Department's "Atomic Warfare Primer" was requested as many times during the last three months as all other departmental health literature during the last year. To date, 250,000 copies of this booklet have been distributed.

Former Herald Reporter Joins 'Atomic' Paper

Bob Brown, former Torrance Herald reporter, has been appointed city editor of the Los Alamos, N. M., Herald, it was announced by Richard Everett, publisher.

The Los Alamos Herald serves the 11,000 persons living within the fenced-in "Atomic City" where most of the nation's atomic research is being conducted.

Brown, son of E. B. Brown, Torrance Herald business manager, has also worked for the San Pedro News-Pilot and the Michigan Daily, Ann Arbor, Mich.

He studied journalism at San Jose College and the University of Michigan.

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
