or after the mail arrives. The armed services are eating into the ranks of the regulars, but frequent use of the reserves is helping strengthen his weakened ranks, he said.

Under training at present is a force of 50 reserves, all in uniform, who will have completed 182 hours of training in the near future. The men are

being taught first aid, sections of the Penal Code, what to do in case of an A-bomb attack, and other subjects relative to civilian defense.

Differing from the reserves in uniform during World War II, these men have the same authority as members of the regular force. They carry sidearms and are authorized to write citations and make arrests should the occasion demand.

During the last war Stroh had no reserves in uniform. He plans to maintain the present reserve force at 50 members.

The non-paid members of the Torrance Police Department are under the command of Captain Willard Haslam.

The Choosy Killers

Coronary heart disease and hypertension are choosy killers. They select the able, the energetic, the hearty eaters, the obese, and those with uncontrolled diabetes or kidney disease. They take our most dynamic citizens, ambitious men whose virtues prove their undoing.

Many men, and I say men, because women rarely suffer the violent death of coronary heart disease. Many men could be saved if they could be taught to avoid what invites artery damage. Worry, tension, overwork, overfatigue — these all seem to predispose to hypertension and heart disease.

It is my belief that if the nerve tension of the body can be relaxed by normalizing nerve flow to the tissues, especially to the arteries, these blood vessels will relax and not hold back the normal flow of the circulation. Remember, it is nerves that cause the blood vessels of the face to dilate and cause the face to flush during excitement or embarrassment. It is only common sense to assume that these same nerves can make the body tissues contract, even to the point of an attack of angina pectoris.

I also believe that faulty metabolism causes deposits of cholesterol (fat) in the walls of the blood vessels, which become as hard as lime and block the flow of blood.

Therefore, in treating these conditions I endeavor to correct faulty body mechanics and metabolism with a resultant improvement in health to the patient. My methods strive to prevent illness. After a heart attack or stroke it is often impossible to restore the damage by any method or treatment.
