

West Basin Directors Set Meeting

A meeting of the West Basin Municipal Water District board of directors has been scheduled

for next Monday in the district office in Hermosa Beach. Reviewing the steps that have been initiated by West Basin water users to stop the advance of salt water into the fresh water supply, an official of the district outlined the four-point program now in force.

1. The filing of the water rights adjudication suit in 1946 to enforce by court order a drastic curtailment of pumping. 2. The acquiring for the area of a supplemental supply of water from the Metropolitan Water District. 3. The creation of a fresh water pressure barrier along the coast through use of water injection wells as an emergency measure to stem the salt water

invasion. 4. Full scale Basin replenishment to raise ground water levels to above sea level. In the first phase of the program, a report of the Referee to the Court, for the 1946 suit will be submitted this fall. Phase number two is largely completed inasmuch as about two-thirds of the area has

acquired imported Colorado River water. A bill now before the Assembly asked an appropriation of \$900,000 to carry out the program of phase three. To accomplish step four, it would be necessary to amend

certain sections of the Los Angeles County Flood Control act officials say. An Assembly bill now pending would authorize the Flood Control district to expend funds in the Basin to conserve imported or reclaimed water.
