Science Sermon Text 'Unreality' For April 8

The Christly method of casting out that which is foreign to God's nature is considered in the Sunday Lesson-Sermon on "Unreality" in all Christian Science churches.

This declaration from Matthew (7:19) is the Golden Text: "Every tree that bringeth not forth good fruit is hewn down, and cast into the fire." The Scriptural selections include Paul's counsel to the Ephesians: "Be ye therefore followers of God, as dear children; . . . And have no fellowship with the unfruitful works of darkness, but rather reprove them . . . Wherefore he saith, Awake thou that sleepest, and arise from the dead, and Christ shall give thee light" (5:1,11,14).

Correlative citations from "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures" by Mary Baker Eddy include: "Lulled by stupefying illusions, the world is asleep in the cradle of infamy, dreaming away the hours. Material sense does not unfold the facts of existence; but spiritual sense lifts human consciousness into eternal Truth" (p. 95).
