HEALTH O GRAM By Dr. R. A. Larson, D.C., Ph. C. WHAT IS "NCA"

No. "NCA" is not the name of a government bureau, but the initials used by doctors to abbreviate a common syndrome, neuro-circulatory asthenia. The condition is also known as cardiac neuro-irritable heart, and effort syndrome. It is a nuisance and occasionally leads to marked disability, but never shortens life expectancy or causes death in this respect "NCA" markedly differs from coronary heart disease. When the victim exercises or is emotionally upset he becomes aware of a forceful pounding of the heart and now and then of irregularities of the beat. Shortness of breath varies from simple consciousness of breathing, to panting. A choking or smothering sensation is a frequent accompaniment and many notice sharp stabbing or dull aching in the chest. Weakness, giddiness, sweating and tremors are additional manifestations. On examination, no abnormality can be detected and chest x-ray and the electrocardiogram are negative. In spite of findings, the afflicted individual is bothered to such an extent that he cannot bestir himself without encountering distress. In persons with "NCA," little exercise or commotion is needed to bring on the manifestations. The more stable individual is likely to be less troubled with this symptomatology than the very nervous and run-down individual. In my own practice, my nerve relaxing and nerve tracing manipulations have often caused complete cessation of these symptoms, and they did not recur, even after several years elapsed time. Therefore, if you have "tried everything," perhaps my type of therapy will answer your problems. be it neurocirculatory, simple neurasthenia, or muscular pain. R. A. Larson, D. C., Ph.
