Girl Scouts Set Plans for Juliette Low Ingathering

The annual Juliette Low Ingathering of the Harbor Area Girl Scouts will be held Saturday, April 28, in Peck Park, San Pedro. In case of rain the ingathering will take place in Wilhall, 435 North Neptune, Wilmington.

There are 30 troops of Girl Scouts in the Harbor area, ranging from Brownies through Senior Troops. All troops will participate in this play day. The planning is being done by the Junior-Senior Council and the ceremony will be colorful and impressive. Each of the five districts will have different colored arm bands for their Senior Girl Scouts, who will act as hostesses and be responsible for carrying out the following schedule: Registrations from 10-10:30, Brownie games 10:30-11:30, nosebag lunch 11:30-12:30, ceremony and singing 12:30-1:30, Intermediate and Junior High games 1:30-2:30.

This ceremony will honor the Girl Scout founder, Juliette Low. The troop contributions are used to extend Girl Scouting throughout the world, and to send delegates from each country to the International Encampments.

The Twelfth Region, of which Harbor Area is a part, and Regions Two, Five and Seven will participate this year in the International Encampment to be held 68 miles northeast of Portland, Ore., at the foot of Wind Mountain, Wash., from July 17 to August 6. This is a part of the permanent campsite of the Portland Girl Scout Council. It will be a pioneer camp with girls living in groups of ten or twelve in units. Each unit will have its own sleeping tents, outdoor kitchen, fireplace for cooking, and table and benches for dining. The rolling, thickly-wooded terrain, tumbling streams and small lakes of Wind Mountain campsite will afford campers a real opportunity to practice pioneer camping skills with girls from other countries. Each day will be filled with many different types of program activities. Cooking three meals each day will include calling for food at the commissary tent, chopping and gathering wood, building fires, carrying water, and so on. There will be unit hikes, swimming, canoeing, crafts, folk dancing, song fests, exchange dinners (in which several members of one unit join another unit for the meal), campfire programs, Scouts' Own, and color ceremonies. Religious services of the various faiths of campers will be held at or near the camp. There will be visitors' days on which guest Girl Scouts and other friends of Girl Scouting may observe the International Camp. Persons vacationing in the northwest are urged to keep this in mind. Every year four Regions are eligible for the annual Juliette Low awards presented to four Senior Girl Scouts from the United States. A Region is eligible every three years.
