"We think too much about too little and think too little about too much," was the quotation from Leonard Bacon which Mrs. Valley used to sum up the condition of affairs in this country.

"It's a strange situation when two Democrats uncover this corruption during a Democratic regime, while the Republicans only emphasize 'McCarthyism.' Anything can happen in '52—election year," declared this commentator who spoke before an enthusiastic audience of club members and their friends.
