Nursing Job Study Launched By State Nurses' Association

A year-long study of nursing functions, sponsored by the California State Nurses' Association, has been approved by a Citizens Advisory Committee composed of state leaders in the fields of medicine, hospital administration, nursing, public health and civic affairs.

The California survey, one of the first to be launched, follows a nationwide pattern recommended by the American Nurses' Association.

Approximately 50 of California's 250 general hospitals which have been registered by the American Medical Association will be visited, according to Mrs. Margaret Feuille, president of the San Pedro Nurses' Association. Emphasis will be the bedside nurse, although all nurses classes will be studied. All types of hospitals... large and small, private and governmental, rural and urban... will be under study to assure a factual cross-section throughout the state, Mrs. Feuille declared.

The study will be conducted by a professional research firm, retained by CSNA, under the overall guidance of the Citizens Advisory Committee and a smaller Technical Committee, Miss Marion Alford, R.N., director of nursing at Peralta Hospital, Oakland, and a member of the CSNA Board of Directors, was named chairman of the 27-member Citizens Committee.

Dr. Eschscholtz L. Lucia, Ph.D., lecturer in oncology, Cancer Research Institute, University of California Medical Center, San Francisco, is chairman of the five-member Technical Committee.

"Today, in the national emergency, such studies as these have become an imperative necessity," Mrs. Feuille said. "We must do all possible to conserve manpower and nursing already has been declared a critical occupation by the U. S. Department of Labor."

"Obviously, as nurses are recruited for military service and other defense requirements there will be fewer nurses available," Mrs. Feuille continued. "It becomes increasingly necessary to have more factual information than we do at the present time on how nursing personnel are being utilized, and how they can best be utilized."

Miss Shirley C. Titus, CSNA executive director, has pointed out that duties of hospital nurses have changed considerably since World War I and particularly since World War II, with its tremendous advances in medical sciences and technology. "Graduate nurses are performing many functions performed only by doctors prior to World

Wars I and II," Miss Titus asserted. "The studies should assist in determining which of these new functions graduate nurses should or should not perform, and which routine tasks should be delegated to nurses aides, orderlies and others to permit the greatest utilization of professional nurse personnel."

The season for a plentiful supply of fresh strawberries is all too short for most of us. And it's high time to get out those favorite recipes for that wonderful fruit.

GLAZED STRAWBERRY PIE

1 1/2 qts. strawberries
1/2 C. water
1/2 C. sugar
2 1/2 Tbsp. cornstarch
1 Tbsp. butter
Red food coloring
Baked pastry shell
Whipped cream

Wash, drain and hull berries. Crush 2 cups of berries and combine with water, sugar and cornstarch in a saucepan. Bring mixture to the boiling point and cook over simmer flame about 2 minutes or until clear. Add butter and enough red food coloring to give an attractive bright color. Strain glaze mixture and cool slightly.

Fill baked and cooled pastry shell with the remaining quart of berries. Spoon strawberry glaze over all, making sure that all berries are covered. Chill just before serving, top with sweetened whipped cream.

FROZEN STRAWBERRY CREAM

1 C. milk, scalded
1 Tbsp. flour
1/2 C. sugar
1/4 tsp. salt
1 egg, slightly beaten
1 C. crushed strawberries
2 Tbsp. sugar
1 C. heavy cream
