



LUCIEN CAILLIET, COMPOSER, ARRANGER, CONDUCTOR
... He Will Conduct Torrance Municipal Band

Noted Musician Accepts Bid To Act as Band Guest Conductor

Lucien Cailliet, nationally-known conductor, arranger and composer will again be the guest conductor when the Torrance Municipal Band holds its annual spring concert on May 24 in the Torrance Civic Auditorium, it was announced this week by James Van Dyck, director.

Cailliet was for 15 years chief arranger for Leopold Stokowski and the Philadelphia Symphony Orchestra. He came to the west coast in 1940 and spent the following seven years teaching at the University of Southern California and writing music for motion pictures. In 1949 and 1950 he toured the United States as arranger and conductor of the Ballet Russe de Monte Carlo. At the present time he is writing original scores for motion pictures and writing band and orchestra publications.

Cailliet will conduct several of his own compositions on this concert, which marks the third successive year he has appeared in Torrance as guest conductor of one of the groups sponsored by the Torrance Area Youth Bands.

This municipal band concert is one of the events sponsored by the Torrance Area Youth Band during its annual fund-raising drive. Other events include the Southern California Baton Twirling Contest and Band Benefit Parade on May 19, and the youth band's Fifth Anniversary Concert on June 7.
