Belhart Bridge Links Torrance To Long Beach

A missing link, The Belhart Bridge across the Los Angeles river, was forged into a new east-west highway route connecting Torrance with Long Beach and other parts of Orange county during recent dedication ceremonies of the new bridge.

It was hands across the river, not the sea, recently as Mayor Bob L. Haggard of Torrance shook hands with Mayor Burton W. Chace of Long Beach during a ribbon cutting ceremony which marked the opening of the new Belhart bridge.

The \$2,250,000 structure across the Los Angeles River opens a new highway route to Long Beach and Orange County. Traffic headed eastward can approach the span from 223rd street. The approaches are about nine blocks south of Carson street, one of the heavily traveled east-west arteries linking Torrance and other parts of the South Bay with Long Beach.

Supervisor Raymond V. Darby who wielded the scissors during the wind-raked ceremony said he was fostering a movement to change the name to Wardlow Road Bridge, Wardlow Road leads to the bridge from the Long Beach side.

In the master plan of high-speed freeways of the future, the bridge will perform as the key link across the river for the proposed Sepulveda Freeway and a connecting link with the Long Beach Freeway which will traverse the east bank of the river.

Harbor Hospital Head Assumes Duties in L.A.

J. E. Smits, director of Harbor General Hospital here for the past six years, was named administrator of Childrens Hospital in Los Angeles this week, according to an announcement by Edgar C. Hummel, president of the Childrens Hospital Society.

Replacing Smits at Harbor General will be Alfred L. Thomas, according to County Superintendent of Charities Arthur J. Will. Thomas has taken over on a temporary basis pending Civil Service examinations.

Smits has been associated with County General Hospital for the past 14 years. Before coming to Harbor General in 1946, he served as personnel director, procurement manager, and assistant of the County General. He staffed and equipped the hospital here when it was taken over by the county following the war. He assumed his new duties at Childrens Hospital Monday.

Thomas, who took over at Harbor Monday, has been assistant director of the county's Olive View Sanitarium. He has been in county service since 1930, and is a former director of research for the Charities Department.


