Potters Local started their B league play with a 1-0 victory over the Steelworkers. The game was a pitchers' duel with Milt Wenzel allowing only three scattered hits for his win, and Al Ferra chalking up a three-hitter while losing.

Hank Brissinger's Torrance Hardware nine chalked up a win for their first game of the season when they downed Earl Clayton's National Supply squad 8-4 last Friday. Brissinger pitched a 6-hit game for the win while Art Huntsman was the National chucker. He allowed nine hits.

Brow won his heat in the 180-yard dash in the C classification in the new time of 18.7. It was the fastest clocking he has turned in.

O'Cain qualified for the B pole vaulting finals at 11 ft. Those qualifying in last Saturday's meet will clash with those qualifying in the Chaffey semi-finals at Ontario in the CIF finals.

Dropping out in Saturday's meet were Gary Groves, who failed by a few inches to qualify for the broad jump; Les Mortensen, who was squeezed out of the B-660; Larry Roy, B pole vaulter; Burt Smith, C pole vaulter; and the C relay team composed of Smith, Brow, Don Kasten and Joe Lafferty. Brow was also eliminated in the 120-low hurdles.

Duane Mittan, Torrance's long-winded runner, was third in his heat of the 1320, but failed to qualify as only the first two were tabbed for the finals.

Snow Blankets Crowley Lake

Another unseasonable snow storm last Sunday and Sunday night gave the shore of Crowley Lake, the 10-mile-long "home of the trout" in the Eastern High Sierras, a 4-inch blanket of white, the Los Angeles City Recreation and Park Department reported.

Crowley Lake Manager George Marks said that the snow melted immediately and that the temperature at the huge man-made reservoir was rising rapidly Monday.

Marks' report to the Recreation and Park Department revealed that fishing continues to be "fair" to "good" at Crowley Lake, with the average length of the lake's famous fighting trout caught the week of May 7-13 being 15 inches and their weight 2½ pounds.

Anglers are getting best results at Crowley Lake by still fishing with white salmon eggs and trolling with flat fish and similar wobbling lures, according to Marks.
