I took her down a few days in advance of the anticipated date and she stayed at the guest house in Camp Pendleton, cost at the guest house, \$1.75 a day plus meals. Then when the time came, one of the other expectant mothers drove her the two miles to the hospital. I also stayed at the guest house—took a week's vacation and drove her and the babe home after five days. Total cost at the hospital, \$37.75 (for meals only). This is interesting in view of the adverse publicity in recent newspapers.

The public health nurse from Torrance came to the house today and helped her give the baby his bath. That's an interesting item, Joe. Willie ordered yellow roses from the La Galeria florist, 1657 Crammeay avenue before he left, and they were delivered to the hospital as soon as I let them know the date, with a card written from the husband.

## Moose Lodge To Sponsor Local Boy Scout Troop

As part of its program of greater participation in civic affairs, the Torrance lodge of the Loyal Order of Moose this week accepted sponsorship of a local Boy Scout Troop, joining 165 lodges nationally engaged in this work. George Powell, governor, and Merlin Cook, civic affairs chairman, disclosed this week.

Malcolm R. Giles, director general of the Moose, revealed that more than 5,000 American boys who otherwise would have been refused membership in the Boy Scouts of America are today members of a scout troop due to Moose sponsorship.

Officials of the Boy Scouts of America point out that the only way a boy can join the scouts is to enroll in an existing troop or in a troop that is being organized. Each unit must be sponsored by some organization such as a church, service club

or fraternal lodge. "There are still over 450,000 boys who would like to become scouts in America—many in our own area," said Governor Powell, who has engaged in scouting activities as an individual over a period of many years. "It is most certainly a challenge to the Moose, and to other such organizations, which should be answered." Powell added that sponsorship of the Scouts is but one of many civic affairs projects undertaken by member lodges of the Moose.
