Two Torrance Students Win Achievement Awards

Two Torrance High School seniors were several dollars richer this week after being named with 26 other Southland students as the Bank of America Achievement Awards winners last Friday evening.

Receiving checks from A. J. Gock, chairman of the bank's board of directors, were Barbara Jackson, who received \$250; and Jerry Downing, who was handed a check for \$50.

The presentations were made at a banquet in their honor at the Town and Gown dining room on the campus of the University of Southern California. Five hundred dinner guests had gathered from all over Southern California to witness the ceremony.

MEANING OF SUCCESS
The awards were presented following an address by Dr. W. Ballentine Henley, president of the College of Osteopathic Physicians and Surgeons on "The

Real Meaning of Success." Welcome was extended by Dr. Fred D. Fagg, Jr., president of S.C. Dr. C. C. Trillingham, superintendent of Los Angeles County Schools, presided.

The \$250 award to Barbara Jackson was in the area of liberal arts, while the \$50 award to Downing was in the area of vocational arts.

1600 WINNERS

The affair climaxed weeks of selections in which the 28 finalists won out over 1600 winners of certificates of achievement and gold cups in 153 high schools of 10 Southland counties. The total of \$8000 in awards presented was in addition to similar awards given last week in the Los Angeles City division.

The awards are in recognition of achievement in studies and promise of future success and service to society. The program is now statewide, with \$32,000 in cash awards and 5000 certificates and gold cups offered annually.

Dr. Trillingham was also chairman of the final board of judges who had determined the amount of each finalist's award after several interviews with them yesterday afternoon.

The judges were Dr. Walter R. Hepner, president of S.A.N. Diego State College; Edward L. Abbott, president of Santa Barbara Chamber of Commerce; Mrs. Valley M. Knudsen, past president of Women's Division, Los Angeles Chamber of Commerce; Cash William Blumenthal of Westwood Temple; Mrs. Arthur Belzer, recording secretary of California Federation of Women's Clubs, Los Angeles district; Bernard F. Flynn, president of Pacific Soap Company, Ltd. and James A. Guthrie, publisher of the San Bernardino Daily Sun.
