Adult Program to Hold Summer Time Classes

Classes in the adult educational program will continue to be held throughout the summer, it was announced this week by Donald Manshaw, director. Although the classes are aimed at catering to adults, children classes are invited to attend. Manshaw said, High school students may receive credit for attending the classes. Starting June 11 and ending July 26, a total of 22 different classes will be conducted under the adult education program during the summer.

Classes will include typing, shorthand, dressmaking, physical fitness, social dancing, square dancing and a wide variety of crafts, including cake decorating, ceramics, lamp shades, leathercraft and textile painting. The blueprint and industrial training course held each Tuesday night trains men for both wartime and civilian industrial jobs. The machine shop class trains both men and women, beginning and advanced, in a dozen phases of shop operation which equips people for high-paying, substantial jobs with security.

The physical fitness classes are held each night at the high school from Monday through Thursday from 7 to 10 are open to men and women and feature basketball, badminton, volleyball, calisthenics, reducing, diet methods and other physical exercises fitted to individual needs. These classes are open to all boys and girls, men and women, regardless of residence. Students are asked to go directly to class to register during the week of June 11. At that time the instructor will outline a program tailored to the individual needs of the student. For additional information students are asked to telephone Torrance 645 or call at the Adult Education office at 22nd and San Pedro Community Hospital.
