Garden Lovers Invited to Join New Free Class

A new free adult class, open to children and adults, in gardening and landscape, will be held each Wednesday night from 7 to 10 in room 108 of Torrance High School, starting Wednesday night June 13. Children and adults with individual problems of their own gardens and homes will receive expert, professional advice on plants, flowers and landscaping in this free seven-session course which starts Wednesday night, June 13.

Jet Pilot Decorated In Japan

For his outstanding leadership in the air and extraordinary heroism, jet pilot Lt. Marshall J. Loftus, a Torrance High School graduate in 1942, has been awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross and the Air Medal, according to information received from the Eighth Fighter Bomber Wing now in Japan.

Lt. Loftus who lives at 622 Pine drive, was decorated while standing beside his F-80 Shooting Star on the flight line at an unidentified air base in Southern Japan. His commanding officer, Colonel James B. Tipton, made the presentation.

Loftus was particularly cited for leading a flight of four jets in a strike on an enemy village at extremely long range. He led down alone and swiftly identified the village as housing a large number of communist troops and supplies. Although his sturdy jet had been hit by the intense ground fire, he aggressively led his flight in screaming attacks on the enemy stronghold until it was completely neutralized, his citation reads.

Lt. Loftus is the husband of the former Georgia Billingsley, also a Torrance High School graduate and the father of Donna, 5, and Mark, 1 1/2. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Loftus, lives at 1312 West 218th street.

His group, the 8th, was the pioneer in the Korean conflict, having been the first air unit to be committed to action. Also his group, a member of the hard-hitting Fifth Air Force, was the first American all-jet unit to be put in combat in any war.

Loftus and his entire organization recently received the Korean Presidential Unit Citation from Republic of Korea president Syngman Rhee for extraordinary achievement and heroism against the invading communists.
