Petrol Pirates

rained on 10 counts of petty theft in the Compton Municipal Court by Judge Ralph Pearson.

The hearing and passing of sentence was set for July 11. The petrol piracy was discovered June 9 when the pair's plan of pirating the petrol literally blew sky-high. A spark from the welding torch they were using to install another 300-gallon tank to haul away more stolen gas set fire to fumes from their illegal operation. Arson investigators dis-

covered a 60-foot underground tunnel running from a Wilmington auto painting shop to G.P.S. pipeline running from the Torrance refinery to the harbor. "Stealing our gas is one thing," but peddling the gas in their station under another name is a crime. Although the fuel-pirates may get a probationary sentence from the Compton court, Uncle Sam has a few questions to ask them about the unpaid federal taxes in the gas they swiped. Estimates on the gas missing has ranged from 100,000 to 250,000 gallons. The U. S. wants a penny and half a gallon tax money and the state wants its four and half cents. "GP officials said yesterday: "There is apparently no way of determining just how much they took. We know that less came out of the harbor than went in at Torrance. Just how much above normal operating losses can be attributed to the two men is going to be difficult to estimate." Lloyd and Schaffer had tapped into the main pipe line with a garden hose and were selling this gas in a station they own at 24221 South Avonin boulevard. "An entrance across the street was driving us out of business. We had to do something," they told deputies.
