Bluebirds Win Bye in League Playoff Games

A flip of the coin gave the Torrance Bluebirds a bye in the playoff for championship of the Long Beach Municipal League's first round of play.

Long Beach Merchants and Ocean View will meet next Sunday, then Torrance and the winner of Sunday's game will meet July 8, at the Long Beach Wilson High School diamond at 2:30 p.m.

The second round of play will begin July 15. Winners of the two rounds will meet to determine the champion of the Summer League in Long Beach. The top three teams will be entered in the Southern California Municipal Athletic Federation tournament to open on the Torrance Park diamond August 20.

Juniors Hold Third Spot in CVJB League

With three home games to end the second round of play, the Torrance Juniors are in a good position to improve their third place position in the Centinela Valley league before starting round three with Culver City on July 8.

Last night the Juniors met Gardenia here under the arcs. They beat Gardenia during the first round. Next Sunday they face Hawthorne and on Wednesday afternoon, July 4, they entertain the Harvard Redbirds here in a holiday affair. Game time is 7:30 p.m.

The following Sunday, June 24, the Torrance team dropped the Lynwood Eagles 10-3.

OCEAN FISH—No closed season in Pacific Ocean for salmon, trout, rockfish, tuna, yellowtail, marlin, broadbill swordfish, black sea bass, barracuda, white seabass, bonito, rock bass, sand bass, kelp bass, halibut, cobinita, croaker, lingcod, and cabezone. Bag limits: 3 trout or salmon north of Monterey-San Luis Obispo county line; 2 south; 15 in aggregate, but not more than 10 of any one of other species listed above.

NASCAR Sanctions Championship Stock Race for Saturday Night

Great news for stock car fans was announced yesterday with the story that NASCAR has sanctioned a 100-mile Grand National Championship Race at Carrell Speedway, the night of Saturday, June 30th.

Officials of the Gardena raceway issued the news jointly with Johnny Mantz, western head of NASCAR (National Association of the Stock Car Auto Racing).

This will be the second NASCAR sanctioned race ever held in California. The first was held at Carrell last April and was hailed a great success. The June 30th event will overshadow the opening race, however, as better cars and drivers are expected to race.

Mantz issued preview list of cars and drivers already set for the 100 mile classic. The list includes Hal Cole, 1951 Plymouth; Eric Erickson, 1951 Pontiac; Jim Rathman, Hudson Hornet; George Seeger, 1951 Studebaker V-8; Allen Heath, 1950 Ford; Bill Taylor, 1951 Studebaker V-8; Stan Noble, 1951 Henry J; and Les Bomar, 1949 Pontiac.

Billy Cantrell, Chuck Meekins, Danny Weinberg, Don Cameron, Freddie Lee, and a flock of other drivers are looking for cars, Mantz said. Thirty cars, most of them 1950's and 1951's are expected.
