### New Nurse Bill Up For Governor's Signature

A bill establishing a new nursing classification, licensed vocational nurses, and placing them under the jurisdiction of the Vocational Nursing Practice Act is awaiting Governor Warren's signature, according to word received here today by Margaret Feuille, president of the Harbor Area Nurses' Association.

Introduced several weeks ago by Senator George Miller Jr., chairman, and members of the Senate Interim Committee on Nurse Problems, the bill received final passage in the Assembly on the final day with but one dissenting vote.

The new bill, Senate Bill 1625, provides for licensing those applicants who have tenth grade educational requirements and who have completed a minimum one-year course in accredited schools, or whose experience and educational qualifications are equivalent.

A seven-man board is created by the act and the members, to be appointed for four-year terms by the Governor, will include a licensed physician and surgeon, a registered professional nurse, a hospital administrator, a licensed public health nurse, a public school administrator, and two licensed vocational nurses.

A list of accredited schools, and a course of instructions, are to be prepared by the new board.

"It is believed that this legislation will affect the nurse power in the state both qualitatively and quantitatively," Margaret Feuille said.
