year from the Long Beach downtown district, Horner reported.

With the able assistance of Harold Hines, assistant to the publisher of the Long Beach Press-Telegram, a campaign was initiated 4 years ago in Long Beach which resulted in the installation of additional parking meters and the floating of revenue bonds for the purchase of off-street parking lots. The bonds were sold for 4 1/2 per cent interest and are being retired by revenues from the parking meters, Horner stated. Most communities experience considerable opposition to parking meters before they are installed but after a trial, there is usually a preponderance of favorable sentiment for the meters, Horner said. Shoppers seem to resent less the necessity of putting a few cents into a mechanical device than they do to being fined for overparking in a restricted zone, he commented.

one of three sources: (1) owners of property through assessment districts, (2) contributions by the merchants; or (3) sales tax. In Long Beach, the 1300 parking meters collect \$138,000 a year, and after \$20,000 is deducted for maintenance, leaves us \$118,000 a year to use for buying lots," Horner summarized.

A discussion of the Torrance parking situation followed, which resulted in the naming of a committee of three merchants to consult with the City Council prior to August 14. This is the date that the proposed parking ordinance comes up for final action. It was explained that the proposed ordinance is merely an enabling one, which will permit the City Council to install parking meters at any future date. It does not order the installation now; but does set up a parking authority consisting of five citizens who will administer any revenue that may be derived from meters, if and when they are installed.

Named on the merchants committee, which expected to confer with the City Council last evening at an agenda meeting were: Paget, Sam Levy and Abe Robinson.

Letters were received from Paul Diamond, Bernard Lee and Lou Arbeiter, all now on vacation. These three absentees, as well as several in attendance at the meeting expressed opposition to the installation of parking meters at this time. One merchant indicated that a protest petition was to be circulated.
