Darby Expects Slight Drop In Tax Rate

From present indications, the Los Angeles County tax rate for the current fiscal year will be \$1.6466, which will be a decrease of \$2885, according to Supervisor Raymond V. Darby Tuesday.

"A definite statement on the amount of the tax rate cannot be made at this time," Darby said, "for the reason that no final determination has yet been made on the valuation, which will be based on public utilities. The auditor has not yet cleared his accounts for the year 1950-51, so that final surplus figures are not available."

Darby added that a conservative estimate of \$14,000,000 surplus and a factor of 2 per cent for an estimated delinquency in tax payments, the tax rate of \$1.6466 is indicated. There is a possibility, when final figures are available, that the reduction in the tax rate may closely approach 30 cents.

Buzzing
