Ground for Church Mormons To Break

Groundbreaking ceremonies signifying the start of construction of the new \$120,000 church building project by the Torrance Ward of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints will take place this Sunday morning at the site of the new church at 220th street and Cabrillo avenue, according to Edwin M. Wheat, bishop.

The ceremonies will start at 11:30 a.m. with a talk by Austin Gudmundsen, president of the Inglewood stake, of which the Torrance Ward is a part. He will be accompanied by his first and second counselors, L. Lloyd Prestwich and William G. Woolley.

The actual first shovelful will be turned by three former bishops of the Torrance Ward: David T. Rossiter and Wilford H. Newland, both of Torrance, and Eugene D. Young of Gardena.

Santa Monica Stake President E. Garrett Barlow, formerly president of the Inglewood stake before it was divided into two stakes, will also speak.

Mayer Bob L. Haggard will represent the City of Torrance during the ceremonies.

Cost of the 10,700-square-foot stucco building is expected to exceed \$95,000 for the building proper. It will be two story with a large chapel capable of seating 300 persons. A large recreation room for basketball and dancing will adjoin the chapel. Attached to the main chapel also will be 12 classrooms, kitchen facilities and a Relief Society room.

Actual construction by Walter Sant, Compton contractor and a member of the Compton Ward of the Latter Day Saints, is to start the following Monday morning. The church was designed by Harold W. Burton, architect of Los Angeles and a member of the Mormon Church.

Assisting Bishop Wheat with the building program are his two counselors, Nephi Draper, first counselor, and James Squire, second counselor.
