FOR THE AL FRESCO SUPPER

Don't let hot weather interfere with your pleasure in having friends in for a meal.

Plan an easy menu and invite the crowd. Then, serve supper out of doors if you can. Or throw the windows open wide and use the same easy serving style you adopt for the al fresco meal.

FEATURE ONE HOT DISH

Feeding a gang is no trick at all if you turn your major cooking efforts to one main dish that's hot and hearty. Something that's made in and served from the same utensil is ideal for the summer supper party.

That's where our recipe for savory tamales fits in. It makes twelve good servings and you can divide or multiply it to suit your needs.

Further, you can get it partly made early in the day—refrigerate—and finish the cooking in time for supper.

SAVORY TAMALES PIE

- 1 1/2 C. yellow corn meal
 - 1/2 tsp. salt
 - 6 C. boiling water
 - 1 lb. sausage
 - 1 1/2 lbs. ground beef
 - 1 clove garlic, minced
 - 2 large onions, chopped
 - 1 green pepper, chopped
 - 1 C. chopped celery
 - 2 tsp. salt
 - 3 tsp. chili powder
 - Sprinkling of cayenne
 - 4 drops of tabasco sauce
 - 5 C. solid pack tomatoes
 - 2 C. whole kernel corn
 - 1 C. pitted ripe olives
 - 10 oz. cheddar cheese, grated
- Stir corn meal and salt slowly into boiling water. Use top part of double boiler over direct flame. Cook, stirring constantly, until smoothly thickened. Place over hot water, cover and cook 30 min. Let corn meal mush partially cool. Brown sausage in large deep skillet. When most of fat is fried out, remove all but about 1 tablespoon

of fat. Brown ground beef with sausage. Add garlic, onions, green pepper, and celery and saute for about 5 min. Add salt, chili powder, cayenne, tabasco sauce, tomatoes and corn. Let simmer for 15 min. Line the bottom and sides of large shallow oiled baking dish (about 10x14x2") with about 1/2 of the partially-cooked mush. Fill with meat mixture. Sprinkle with cheese and drop spoonfuls of the remaining mush on top. Press ripe olives into drops of mush. Set modern gas range oven heat control at 350° and bake for 1 1/2 hours.

REST OF MENU IS EASY

Most meals seem more party-like when there's a first course. And a vegetable juice cocktail will be excellent with this one.

Mix equal parts of chilled tomato vegetable cocktail and canned juice and tip up the flavor with a little lemon juice, Worcestershire sauce and a dash of tabasco. Serve with crackers spread with a cheesy spread.

Crisp greens, tossed with your favorite dressing, make the salad. An icy bowl of relishes, hot buttered French bread and steaming hot coffee complete the menu except for dessert.

Melons and fresh fruits give a wonderful ending to many summer meals. But, if you're sure that's just too easy maybe you'd rather make something special. A luscious frozen dessert made with peaches is the answer.

PEACH CREAM SHERBET

- 1/2 C. crushed fresh peaches
 - 1/2 C. sugar
 - 1 tsp. unflavored gelatin
 - 2 Tbsp. cold water
 - 1/2 C. boiling water
 - 1/2 C. whipping cream
 - 1 egg, separated
- Mix crushed peaches, lemon juice and sugar and chill for an hour or two. Soften gelatin in cold water and dissolve in boiling water. Stir gelatin into fruit mixture and freeze until almost firm. Whip cream. Beat egg white until stiff and yolk until light. Fold egg into whipped cream. Put partly frozen fruit mixture into a chilled bowl and beat until frothy. Fold whipped cream mixture into fruit. Return to freezing tray and freeze until firm.
