JAYCEES TO CIRCULATE WATER BOND PETITIONS

Three Hurt As Car Collides With Local Bus

Three persons were injured in a collision involving an auto and a Torrance Municipal bus at East road and Vermont avenue Tuesday afternoon. Two of the victims were passengers in the bus.

Those hurt were Mrs. Mary Edwards, 15015 Suro avenue, Gardena; her granddaughter, Sharon Edwards, same address, and Walter J. Williams, 1815 Park avenue, Los Angeles.

Williams, according to Highway Patrol Officer C. J. Ness, was driving his car east on East road when he collided with the north-bound bus. He was treated for head lacerations and a possible fractured rib.

Mrs. Edwards suffered a possible broken leg and Sharon received back injuries. All were transported to Harbor General Hospital by Figueredo and Miller Ambulance Service.

None of the others riding on the bus, driven by Frank M. Huff, 16461 Cabrillo avenue, required hospitalization.

Civic Group Seeks 1000 Signatures

Members of the Junior Chamber of Commerce this week took over the job of obtaining 1000 signatures of registered voters in Torrance to the petition asking for an election on the proposed \$2,000,000 Water Bond.

Ed Karlow, former Jaycee president and chairman of the petition committee, said yesterday that the Junior Boosters had agreed to circulate the petitions in an effort to put over the bond campaign. They will do it as a civic project, he said, and will receive no compensation for it.

Petitions were received late last week by City Clerk A. H. Bartlett, and he and City Manager George Stevens immediately prepared the instructions and data necessary to get the circulation started. The Jaycees met with the city manager Tuesday evening for a briefing, and started immediately to canvass the area for signatures.

First signature on the petitions was that of George Peckham of 1518 Post avenue. Jaycee Member Charles Schultz Jr. presented the petition for his signature after the meeting Tuesday night.

City officials hope to have the petitions returned within 10 days in order to set up an election for November 13. The election would call for the creation of a new consolidated water district for Torrance combining the present Municipal Improvement District No. 1 and Municipal Water Districts Nos. 1 and 2.

New Supervising Nurse Named for Health Center

The new Torrance supervisor received her nurses' training at the Army School of Nursing, Presidio, San Francisco and her public health nursing certificate from UCLA.

Last Respects Paid To Veteran Officer

Members of the Torrance Police Department turned out in full Tuesday morning to tender a final salute to a veteran police officer.

Funeral services for Capt. Frank Joseph Schumacher, who had been with the local law enforcement agency for 23 years, were conducted at Stone and Myers Chapel. A private cremation followed at Ingelwood Park Crematory.

Eleven uniformed peace officers served as honorary pallbearers. Other members of the department, as well as many local citizens, were present to pay last respects to a fine policeman.

Schumacher joined the police service on June 1, 1928. Six years later he was promoted to sergeant and on July 1, 1940, the rank of captain was bestowed upon him. He held this position until his death, at the age of 58.

Famous Songwriter Hurt in Auto Crash

Songwriter Mack Gordon, who composed such popular hits as "Chatanooga Choo-Choo," "You'll Never Know" and "Time On My Hands," was on the mend this week after being hurled from his late model convertible at Western avenue and Carson street in a collision with another car early Sunday morning.

Rushed to Harbor General Hospital by Figueredo-Miller ambulance, he was later transferred to Cedars of Lebanon Hospital in Hollywood, where his physician, Dr. Elliott Corday, termed Gordon's condition as "serious but not critical."

The lyricist was painfully injured when his car collided with a light sedan driven by Osborne Nomeland, 36, of Venice, Nomeland was also thrown from his

car, but was not critically injured, attendants said. Gordon told Los Angeles police that he was driving north on Western when the other car suddenly appeared in front of him.

"I don't remember anything else," he said.

In another accident during the Labor Day week-end, Jesus Herrera, 27, of 1238 West 213th street, was booked by San Pedro police on a charge of suspicion of felony drunk driving when his car swerved out of control on the Wilmington-San Pedro road crashing into a utility pole. Ernest Villapando, of Long Beach, a passenger with Herrera, was treated at Wilmington Emergency Hospital for possible fractured ribs, cuts and bruises.

Auto-Pedestrian Crash Fatal to Father of Five

Struck by an auto while walking on Torrance boulevard near Bow street, Frank F. Gonzales, 46, was pronounced dead on arrival Thursday morning at the Harbor General Hospital.

Gonzales, who had resided at 2461 W. 203rd street for only three months, was employed by the National Electric Products Company and was living with his sister, Mrs. Bertha White.

Surviving him are his wife, Margarita, five children, a sister, brother and mother, all living in El Paso, Texas. Police reported that Gonzales was carrying six pairs of shoes which he had purchased the night before to send to his family in Texas.

Clifford Stewart, 62, of 1731 W. 235th street, was the driver of the auto which struck the victim. He was not held, police said. Stone and Myers Mortuary, who handled preliminary arrangements, sent the body to El Paso for funeral services.
