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Darby to Open New Link to Sea This Afternoon

Supervisor Raymond V. Darby will snip a green and yellow ribbon this afternoon and open a public highway cutting across

the center of the Palos Verdes Peninsula and opening an area that has been private since California was under Spanish rule.

The high speed road, part of which is Crenshaw boulevard, will climb to the 1000-foot crest of the Palos Verdes Hills, then

drop down to the peninsula coastal drive near Point Vicente lighthouse. The road to be opened this afternoon is comprised of Montemalaga drive, Silver Spur road, Crenshaw boulevard, and Crest

road. It originates on Palos Verdes Drive north, half a mile east of the Palos Verdes Estates boundary, and terminates on Palos Verdes Drive west, half

a mile west of Point Vicente lighthouse.

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
