### Science Lecture Takes Text From Book of Psalms

And it came to pass that, as they went, they were cleansed. And one of them, when he saw that he was healed, turned back and with a loud voice glorified God." (17: 14-15).

In the Christian Science text book, "Science and Health with the Key to the Scriptures," Mary Baker Eddy says (pp. 229, 94), "It is a transgression of a belief of Mortal Mind, not of a law of matter nor of Divine Mind, which causes the belief of sickness."

### Loyalty Month Program Noted

October is church loyalty month in the Methodist Church. At the local Methodist Church, at El Prado and Mariposa avenues, the minister, Rev. Clarence E. Miller, will begin a series of sermons on prayer at the Sunday morning service, beginning at 10:50.

A visiting minister will help in each local church.

The second period of operation of this Evangelistic Advance will involve churches outside of the 50-mile radius of Los Angeles, with the ministers of Los Angeles area serving as leaders.

### Suffragan Bishop to Dedicate New St. Andrew's Addition

The Right Rev. Donald J. Campbell, Suffragan Bishop of the Diocese of Los Angeles will hold a Service of Dedication at St. Andrew's Episcopal Church here Wednesday evening, October 17, it was announced this week by Rev. Arthur E. Bello, rector of St. Andrew's.

The newly completed educational building is the cause of this celebration, Reverend Bello said. The new structure contains seven classrooms, a choir room for the storage of vestments and music, and a new office for the rector in a more accessible location than the former office.

The value of the new building is estimated at \$40,000, although the efforts of the men and women of the church in constructing the building kept the actual cost under \$16,000, Rev. Bello said.

All of the work done was under the direct supervision of Jack Miller, vestryman.

"He gave not only his time, but all of his building skill to complete the job economically and on time for our dedication service," the rector said.

The dedication dinner will be served at 7 p.m. following the church service. Mrs. Jack Miller and Mrs. Frank Church are co-chairmen of a committee for the dinner plans. They will be assisted by members of various organizations at St. Andrew's.
