

'NATIVE SON' OPENS OPTOMETRY OFFICE

Children Being Reared in Most Dangerous Spot, Warns Doctor

"Children are being reared in the most dangerous place in the world—at home."

"This year non-traffic accidents will kill more children than all the childhood diseases combined," Dr. Don C. Moshos told the Torrance Lions Club last week.

"Modern drugs have brought about the greatest drop in the childhood death rate in history. Yet, today just as many children are dying as at the turn of the century. The complexities of modern living, automobiles, electrical appliances, new home-chemicals and other innovations are taking their toll of the nation's children," he said.

"Swallowing foreign objects," he warned, "small toys, trinkets and harmful chemicals such as lye and ant paste are the greatest cause of injury and death to small children," the local medical man stated.

"Buy no toy for your child small enough for him to put in his mouth," he cautioned.

Speaking on child safety, he enumerated some of the most common causes of childhood accidents: drowning in the bathtub, scalding, poisoning, falling on sharp objects, backing over children with automobiles; touching electric wires, strangling, burning by flames and playing with unguarded home machinery.

He urged the members to inventory their homes and eliminate those conditions which might result in a child being injured or killed.

"Get poisons up out of reach, unload and place under lock and key all firearms; discard or repair frayed electrical cords and appliances and look before moving your car—forward or backward," he warned.

"Don't leave a small child in the bathtub while you answer the phone, pull out the iron and place it in a safe place if you must leave the ironing board, and hide matches and cigarette lighters from small, inquisitive children," Dr. Moshos suggested.

"To maim a child is to create a lifetime headache for the maimed and the maimer," he concluded.

Verdie Presley Attends Army Refresher Course

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
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
