Disaster Nursing Course Opens Tonight at Hospital

Everyone who breathes should, for his own protection, be interested in civilian defense. As professional people, the Harbor Area Nurses Association feel it their duty to assume their role in disaster nursing.

At a recent nurses meeting Bernardine Clark, assistant director of nurses at Harbor General Hospital, explained a planned series of five sessions concerning disaster nursing. The classes will be held each Thursday from 7:30 to 9:30 o'clock tonight to November 8 at the Harbor General Hospital in Torrance.

The following vital topics will be explained and discussed: Civil Defense Organization. Atom Bomb—All its destructive effects and how to care for the sick and injured. Equipment needed and how to improve equipment. Obstetrical patients. Chemical warfare. Mental health aspects of disaster nursing.

Films on various subjects will be shown and qualified doctors, instructors and a representative from the U. S. Army will be at the various classes to instruct and answer questions. The course of instruction is free and all registered nurses and their husbands or men friends should plan to avail themselves of the opportunity to learn more about their place in the civilian defense setup in this area, states Margaret Feulle, president of district 21, Harbor Area Nurses Association.

Tonight's program will be augmented with a film, "The Tale of Two Cities," depicting the ruins of Hiroshima and Nagasaki following the memorable atomic explosions.
