In each case the "gadding about" is supposed to be taking place during the day. To which Mr. Almond says, "It's nice work if you can get it."






Button, Button, Who's Got the Button?

Pacific Hills Street Light Canvass Starts

Earl Sampson, 3108 Winlock drive, this week was named to head the Pacific Hills Civic Association's drive for the installation of street lights throughout the 435-home area.

Sampson was selected chairman of the street light committee which hopes to wrap up its job of collecting \$6500 by next Jan. 1, it was announced by Alton Langston, president of the association.

The homeowners are being assessed \$15 each to meet the cost of installing hard-to-get steel poles at 225-foot intervals throughout the area. The money will be paid to the city of Torrance and then turned over to the Edison Company.

Assisting Sampson at the head of the 13-member committee, which will canvass the area shooting for 100 per cent participation, is Mrs. Robert Osborn. Preliminary reports will be made in two weeks.

Witnessing a proclamation signing ceremony in the Mayor's office, Rev. Paul Wenske, chairman of the Torrance Council of Churches, urged the residents of the area to pause and pray for the organization that is trying to find a way to peace in the world.

He said special church services were being planned by many Torrance churches in observance of the United Nations.

His auto had been knocked from over him and sent some 50 feet, along Normandie avenue by a brand new "Henry J." driven by LeRoy E. Smith, 29, of 233 West Carson street, an employee of the Harbor General Hospital. Smith's car, with a portion of the front wheel jammed through the firewall into the front seat, had less than 2000 miles.

With Smith was James W. Chason, 20, of 22426 South Main street. Both were taken to the Wilmington Receiving Hospital, where Smith was treated for a bruised chest and possible rib fractures, and Chason for cuts and multiple bruises. Carter, his head lying only inches from where Smith's auto passed by him, was unharmed.


This service will be available not only to students at El Camino, but to any person living in the college district.
