

Colds May Lead to Rheumatic Fever, Health Officer Warns

Winter is approaching again and with it the usual steep rise in occurrence of colds and throat infections. While we sneeze and cough or struggle to keep our children's noses looking respectable we should keep in mind that good care and the exercise of a few common sense precautions during this period can do much to lessen the possibility of rheumatic fever.

Rheumatic fever is the leading cause of death of children aged 10 to 14. It is responsible for 95 per cent of all defective hearts in children and, according to recent estimates, 60 per cent of all children who have had rheumatic fever suffer varying degrees of heart involvement. Nevertheless, it is a milder disease than it used to be and it is less likely to be fatal than it was even ten years ago.

No specific cause of rheumatic fever has yet been determined, but statistical studies indicate that several factors seem to go hand in hand with the occurrence of the disease.

A streptococcus infection which may occur in the form of septic sore throat, infected tonsils, and scarlet fever usually precedes the disease. The incidence of rheumatic fever always rises after an epidemic of "strep" infections.

A damp, cold climate seems to favor the disease; thus more cases are found in the northern regions of the country than in the southern. No place however, is completely free from rheumatic fever, not even the California desert. Inadequate housing, crowded living conditions, and deficient diet appear to accompany the disease.

Symptoms of rheumatic fever may vary from the very obvious such as continuous fever, pain, and swelling of the joints, to the most negligible signs of sub-standard health such as general fatigue, loss of appetite, and slightly elevated temperature. Symptoms usually occur two to four weeks after a strep infection.

No vaccine has as yet been found for the prevention of rheumatic fever. However, a re-

cent study indicates that treatment may be aided through the oral administration of penicillin. Further studies are needed for confirmation.

Prevention of the disease consists mainly in eliminating the factors favoring rheumatic fever. Contact with "strep" infections should be avoided. Adequate clothing for changing temperatures, as well as a well balanced diet and safe housing are important factors in preventing rheumatic fever.

Long bed rest is indicated for almost every child who suffers from the disease.

Post War Babies Pose New School Housing Problem

"Having kept pace with the war babies, the question now facing the Board of Education is, can we keep up with the post-war babies and house the children of the city of a population of 90,000 persons?"

This was the verbal picture painted Tuesday night by Dr. J. H. Hull, superintendent of schools, in alerting the Torrance Board to the problem of providing classrooms in one of the most rapidly expanding communities in California.

"We have seen our last small first grade class for at least six years. We are hot at the end of a building program," Dr. Hull said.

To support his contention, the superintendent pointed to enrollment figures of 1948-9 and compared them with those of today.

"Three years ago the kindergarten enrollment was 330 students. These students are now in the fourth grade which has an enrollment of 603 students—almost double in three years," he said.

He pointed out that these children were "move-ins," the offspring of families which have moved to Torrance within three years.

Dr. Hull continues: "We are beginning to find out what happened to the birth rate when the G.I.s came home. They are no longer birth rate statistics—a number—eight—they are alive, walking, playing, active children, for whom we must provide school housing at once."

These children will require every bit of bonding capacity the District possesses. They will require every bit of aid from other sources that we can muster. The policy of the District must include stiff, strict, unbending economy in the building program to make the funds go as far as possible. Other sources of funds must be found. These are facts that must be faced.

Most of the school districts in the state are in the same predicament. The people need to think through the school financing problem. It is one of the most important matters facing the citizens of Torrance
