

Y Debonnaires To Wash Cars Next Saturday

A car-washing project scheduled for last Saturday morning by members of the Y Debonnaires and Y-Teen groups at Torrance High School was rescheduled when the mercury dropped to 29 1/2 during the night.

"We are going ahead and hold it next Saturday, instead," said Shirley York, president of the girls' group.

The car-washing project, by which the girls hope to raise money to finance some furnishings for the recently-dedicated YWCA building here, will be held at Phipps service station at Carson street and Fern avenue.

The girls have been selling car-wash tickets for 50 cents and promise that any tickets sold for last week will be good for next Saturday.

"They can get their money back, if they wish," Shirley said of the ticket holders.

The group will wash cars from 10 a.m. until 4 p.m., the president said.

December Worst Time For Losses From Fire

Fire losses have been greater during the month of December than at any other time, figures released by Fire Chief J. J. Benner reveal.

March, January, February and April follow in that order, Benner said. Reason for the heavy December losses is careless handling of heating facilities.

Faulty chimneys, stoves, furnaces and other heating devices are the second largest cause of fire. Nearly 20 per cent of all winter fires can be blamed to these causes, Benner's figures showed.

One of the bigger fire hazards is a portable heater, said Benner, describing a portable heater as "a portable fire." Another cause of fires is "forcing" a furnace or heater that is giving insufficient heat.

Benner offered five more safety tips for winter months. They are:

- 1. Never try to "speed up" a fire by using gasoline or kerosene.
2. Keep a metal screen in front of your fireplace.
3. Rubbish anywhere in your house is a fire hazard. Get rid of it.
4. Be careful with hot ashes. Use a metal container with a cover on it to move them. Do not take them outside on a windy day, and never put them in a wooden or cardboard container.
5. Keep wood, coal and inflammable liquids away from furnaces. Keep furnace rooms cleared of trash.
